

Reading

You can make a colorful bird by using circles and triangles of different sizes and colors. Use any color you like for any part of the bird. Use a two-inch circle to make the bird's body. To make the head, glue a one-inch circle to the bigger circle. Cut two two-inch circles in half so that you have four half-circles. Glue them to the back of the bird to create

tail feathers. Make the wings from a one-inch circle cut in half. For its beak,

you may cut two small bright yellow triangles. You can also use triangles to make some small plume feathers atop its head. Glue the bird onto a sheet of paper. You can draw the legs and feet on with a crayon or colored pencil.






