


PREFACE

The Bible Story Reader is composed of 40 Bible stories. The selections include 20 Old Testament and 20 New Testament selections. Each selection includes a simple retelling of the Bible story suitable for a three-year-old. However, if you have older children, they may enjoy the reading as well. A work of art depicts each selection. These rich illustrations bring the story to life for the young student. Included with the story and picture are a number of thought questions to help you further engage the student in the story. At times these questions can extend the lessons learned into the student's life. Each Bible story concludes with a simple prayer. The student workbook includes at least one activity for each Bible story.

A new Bible story is also presented each week. You may want to read and discuss the Bible story each day you have class. Students at this age enjoy having stories read and reread to them. Eventually the student may want to look at the picture and tell you the story.

A New Home



Jesus Feeds 5,000
